The job demands a flexible approach and frequent evening and weekend working will be required.

You need to have excellent interpersonal and communication skills with the ability to manage a diverse workload. You must be enthusiastic, able to enthuse others and self motivated. You need to understand fully and be committed to the ethos of the Scout Association, with a clear grasp of how it can work in rural and urban communities.

You must have a full driving licence and be familiar with Microsoft Office applications. Previous experience in youth work and the voluntary sector is desirable
