
Thank you from the bottom of my heart to all those who have made it happen. You are truly amazing.

I'd love to welcome friends old and new to join me in continuing to make a difference to young people throughout Hertfordshire. After all, the number one skill in life is not giving up!



My aim is to reignite our programme support across the County, working with the County Programme Team and the ADCs to deliver the strategy to support the restart of Scouting in new and innovative ways.



International

For Hertfordshire Scouts International section, the pandemic started earlier than for most, as we began to realise in late 2019 and early 2020 that all the planned expeditions were going need to be shelved, cancelled, or at least delayed. We were in the unenviable position of needing to provide advice to our Leaders about how to proceed in a situation about which we had no more knowledge than the Leaders themselves. All we could do was to gain information from the experiences of friends and colleagues in other parts of the UK and other Countries around the World and use that information to help us guide our Leaders. Some expeditions were deferred, some completely cancelled, and we were quick to advise everyone not to pay any more deposits in case they were lost. We also very quickly learnt a lot about the insurance industry which, understandably withdrew Coronavirus cover very early on, and in doing so left some of our expeditions hanging in the balance for weeks and months. It became a simple situation, where if Scouting UK said we could not travel, then the insurance would cover everything, but if we cancelled because we knew the parents would no longer let their children travel, then it would not. As a result, there was a long agonising wait for the Association to announce that no one could travel and when that announcement finally came, we were able to shut down our remaining trips and breathe a deep sigh of relief. But after that what else could we do? Well, there was a need to provide guidance going forward and to encourage Leaders to plan for the return to travel, but also a need to ensure that no one paid any deposits to avoid any further losses. After that we needed to think about what else we could do to keep international Scouting going, whilst remaining compliant with the new Covid regulations. There was still JOTA and JOTI as well as the Scout of the World Award (SOWA) and The Scouts Against Malaria Campaign (SAM) and planning for the next Jamboree, and we could also still move money around the World, and so that was exactly what we did.

JOTA and JOTI

JOTA is the Jamboree on the air, and JOTI is the Jamboree on the Internet, and both were able to take place during the pandemic because they could be organised and participated in by members from their own homes with Leader guidance and parental support.

The event is one of the longest running Scouting events, having started in 1958 and over the years UK Scouts have contacted Scouts from all over the World and formed lasting friendships and often visited one another because of the contacts made.

Scout of the World Award

I first came across the Scout of the World Award (SOWA) when participating in a County-led trip to Swaziland in 2009, and I was determined that Hertfordshire Scouts should promote the award to the Network section, because it is the only award that is available exclusively to the Scout Network. When it was adopted in the UK a year or so later, the UK interpretation of the requirements meant that it was almost impossible to obtain, and so whilst we tried very hard, we were unable to get anyone from Hertfordshire through the award. This was due mainly to a lack of Discovery weekends which had to be attended by all participants in order to complete the award. Fast forward a few years and in 2016 after changes in the requirements, I challenged Alexander Hawkins, who had recently joined our Global Support Team, to become the first Hertfordshire Network member to complete the award. Well, he certainly kept me waiting, but he finished his project about a year ago, and this year, after some encouragement, made his presentation and became the first Hertfordshire Network member to complete the award. He has also already started to support two other Network members in the County to get their awards as one of two newly qualified SOWA Mentors in the County. It was a long wait, but worth it, and it proves that even in a pandemic we can adapt our Scouting and still make things happen.

Scouts Against Malaria

The original aim of the Scouts Against Malaria (SAM) campaign was to purchase and distribute malaria nets in affected countries, by engaging with local Scouts in both the distribution and education of those exposed to the malaria-carrying mosquito's. It had been established that whilst nets were being distributed throughout the affected countries, that local people often did not understand how they were to be used and so the Scouts were to be asked to demonstrate how to correctly set up and use a net. Since then, the campaign has developed and now also engages in destroying the mosquito roosts as well as net purchasing and distribution.

The Hertfordshire Global Support Team first launched their SAM campaign in January 2018 when each District in the County was given a Case of Malaria. The Case of Malaria is a box that contains a wide range of activities designed to raise awareness about malaria and enable members from all sections to raise funds and gain a badge. The contents were originally developed by Hampshire Scouts, and were turned into a booklet by the Hertfordshire Global Support Team and were more recently given an update. Since then, over £7,800 has been raised by participants from all the sections of Hertfordshire Scouts, all of whom earn the SAM Badge which they can wear on their uniform with pride. What I personally like about the SAM campaign is that it really does make a difference by saving lives in places far away from the homes of our members.

Sunday 25 April 2021 was World Malaria Day and so it was rather appropriate that earlier that week the SAM campaign was given a major boost by from 3rd St Albans Griffin Cubs. After discussions with one of their leaders, Michael Bowden, on Tuesday 20 April I was finally able to take part in my first face to face presentation of SAM badges for over 18 months. The leaders had tasked the Cubs with fundraising for the SAM campaign and in the weeks prior to the activity they had made friends with the Tamale Cubs in Uganda. The Cubs enlisted the help of Surrey Scouts to involve their new Ugandan friends in distribution of nets and the education of local people in how to use mosquito nets as well. The Cubs must have worked very hard at their mammoth fundraiser because when Michael and I spoke initially there was a fund of £1300 but by the time of the presentation just a few days later the money raised had increased to £1600 and there were several more promises of money on the night. To remain COVID safe we met in the open air and gave the badges and certificates to the Cubs but swapped our traditional handshake for a Scout salute. It felt good to be back out and doing something, even if my Scout trousers had shrunk in the wardrobe in the previous 18 months! I am personally grateful to the Griffin Cub Pack in St Albans for their tremendous effort. Despite the pandemic, Hertfordshire Scouts earlier in 2021 were still able to transfer some of the funds raised in the SAM campaign to be used for the purchase and distribution of nets. By enlisting the help of Hampshire Scouts who had existing contacts in Malawi, Ghana and Uganda, Hertfordshire money was used to purchase and distribute nets, and that really has made a difference in those countries and saved lives. Updates and videos of the distribution of nets can be found on our website.

Jamboree 2023 South Korea

It is good to be able to look ahead, as we get closer to the time when the restrictions on our daily lives will be lifted, to selecting our Jamboree Leaders. We hope to have three Units or 12 Patrols at the next Jamboree and we have set ourselves a deadline of the end of the summer for our Leader selection to be complete, by the end of the year we hope to have most of the participants in their Units. It is good to have something positive to look forward to.

Finally, as we emerge from what has been one of the strangest periods in everyone's life, we are looking forward to the resumption of our Scout adventures all around the world, making new friends, learning about other cultures, and teaching Hertfordshire Scouts how to become the best world citizens that we can be.



Bishop's Stortford and District

After a 'normal first term' in 2020, we suddenly found ourselves unable to meet – but Scouting didn't stop! Within a week, Leaders were organising challenges for their Sections, sometimes badge-related, sometimes purely fun! Zoom and other social media were used, with Leaders developing skills alongside their Sections to fully utilise the options available. The year has not been easy; we thank everyone for the way in which the members of the District rose to meet, and overcome, the challenges.

One Group created a special badge covering different aspects of Scouting which could be achieved from home, evidence was posted on OSM to ensure an appropriate degree of challenge from Beavers to Scouts, even the Leaders joined in! Camping at home became the norm with most Sections across the District being offered opportunities to camp in the garden or make indoor dens; parents, siblings and pets joining the adventure. It is amazing how many activities were able to be offered virtually: scavenger hunts, cooking over tins, 'recycled robots', microwave mug cakes, icing competitions, loads of cooking, crafts such as string art fleur-de-lis (the skill in using a hammer and nails) and leafy hedgehogs, shoe cleaning, ironing, quizzes, many different games adapted to the virtual environment, and so much more.

We focussed on well-being, being acutely aware that many Leaders and parents were key workers, trying to juggle these responsibilities with schooling and other children's activities. Some Sections worked together to take the stress from these Leaders, an example being a programme offered via a Group blog. A 'thank you tree' was created outside one HQ, stones/eggs were painted and placed around the community for others to find and enjoy, goodie bags were made for residents in a local Care Home, litter-pick challenges around the community, walking and cycling personal challenges were introduced to ensure young people were getting exercise and fresh air. There was an activity to help Cubs improve their sleeping. Beavers learned about overcoming their monsters and how to talk about their feelings and emotions – who can forget Angry Annie and how to channel energy to be Friendly Freddie!

Another Group has prepared a time capsule which shows what life was like in lockdown; the plan being that in 25 years' time it will be opened.

Badges, Challenge Awards and CSAs were presented virtually, Leader training was introduced via Zoom, the District Cub Christmas 'service' was held via Zoom – we found we could all learn new skills!

East Herts

In May 2020, in aid of International Nurses Day and in gratitude for the phenomenal work our NHS staff and volunteers are doing right now caring for COVID-19 patients, Vladi and Peter Kuna from 1st Harpenden launched the Building A Rainbow from Painted Stones fundraising project.

The response from the whole of the District was fantastic with over 500 stones donated in less than a week and raising £675 for the Luton & Dunstable Hospital Charitable Fund. The hospital sent us a letter of thanks and the High Sheriff of Bedfordshire awarded us a Certificate of Recognition.

The District managed to complete its annual Christmas card deliveries around Harpenden and in Wheathampstead, in a socially distanced way, and just in time before the pre-Christmas lockdown.

District managed to keep its camping going through the year, participating in the Northumberland Scouts CampAtHome, the District Virtual Camp and many Group and Section camps-at-home.



Original plans for the year had included a visit to the home of former Deputy then Chief Scout Lord Somers (who succeeded B-P in 1941) and invitations for Frank to visit and speak to various Groups in Hertfordshire but these had to be postponed. In addition, it has not been possible to welcome visitors to Well End but the Team have been able to continue to answer enquiries from Groups and Districts about their history and give advice about how and where to conduct research. Legacy collections, and other valuable donations, continue to be received but have been stored temporarily in Frank's study at home as have numerous press articles published during the pandemic. Plans have been made to transfer these to the Archive Cabin freeing up much needed space for Frank.

The history of our Movement provides many excellent examples of how Scouts have risen to the challenges caused by hardship and adversity. For example, during both World Wars Groups throughout the Country collected herbs and other natural materials to be turned into medicines, much needed by troops and the general population, due to the shortage of pharmaceutically produced products. The History & Heritage Team is proud to have followed in this fine tradition and looks forward to again welcoming visitors at Well End and attending local Group meetings to inform our young members about our rich Scouting heritage.

Frank Brittain is a prolific photographer and the County Archives contain many interesting historic images, a couple of which are shown on this page. The Team look forward to being able to welcome you back to the County Scout Museum in the coming months.

We have also learnt the value of building versatile teams with varied, yet complementary, skills.
