

YouShape Scouting in Hertfordshire!

YouShape Scouting has been a major part of Scouting since day one! The way it has looked has changed over the years but the principle is still the same - ensuring that your people can shape and lead their Scouting experience!

With the introduction of Youth Commissioners over the last few years the uptake has varied, with 6 out of 18 Districts having a district Youth Commissioner (DYC) in place. In December 2021 the Hertfordshire Scouts appointed the first County Youth Commissioner.

Changes are coming in the next few years the role of the Youth Commissioner to champion and embed change will be vital to make sure that young people are supported and reassured throughout this, resulting in the recruitment of the district Youth Commissioner being one of my priorities going forward.

The launch of the YouShape award in 2021 was an extremely exciting time for the movement, to support adult volunteers the Youth Commissioners across Hertfordshire are in the middle of creating extra resources, presentations, and workshops that will be hosted on our webpage which is coming soon.

The day was live on Zoom, with parents commenting on the Facebook page. The day was fantastic success and thank you to all Leaders who helped on the core team to make it go so smoothly.

Two of these happened at Well End Campsite and the other at Wymondley Wood Campsite. We had numbers coming in thick and fast with one weekend having only three spaces left. We have never delivered such a wealth of knowledge to DSNCs before, and I know those who attended came away with great advice for their Networks.

Building on the success of lockdown's Virtual Network Winter Walking Week we ran the week-long event again in the spring, asking Network members to go for a walk every day for one week and document their travels. Of course we threw in some 'Scouty' and not so 'Scouty' tasks for them to complete on their walk to keep things interesting. The week rounded off with a joint group walk, something we were not previously able to do, getting everyone together from across the County. A fantastic week of walking was had by everyone and some brilliant photos and stories were shared.

Lastly, Alex Hawkins became the first Scout in Hertfordshire to complete and be awarded the Scouts of the World Award (SOWA). The SOWA is a badge only available to Network members. The badge was awarded at a presentation in Knebworth Park where we planted a tree to mark the occasion, which fitted in nicely with Alex's theme for the award which was sustainable development. In attendance were family and Scouting friends from across the County. A huge well done to Alex, and we hope this is the start of many more SOWAs to come.

Now the Networks are all back doing what they do best: meeting up together, gaining top awards and shaping their own Scouting future as only they know best!

International Matters

International Scouting has been very much on hold throughout the last two years and now when organising trips for the future we must include allowances for Covid in all our plans. Going forward there should be four trips abroad that went ahead in Summer 2022 and looking forward, with the next Jamboree taking place in 2023 we should have a bumper summer of trips abroad in 2023.

Scouts Against Malaria

One of the consequences of putting vast resources into the fight against Covid 19 has been a dramatic increase in the number of cases of malaria throughout the World. By diverting the medical staff to fight the Coronavirus, many prevention campaigns have not taken place and it is reflected in the case numbers. Below is some input from 1st St Albans who have been supporting the campaign.

The journey so far...

During COVID 1st St Albans connected with a Group in Tamale (N Ghana) for an online session; they taught each other games, and asked each other questions. To continue the theme we cooked Jollof Rice on our campfire (a Ghanaian staple) – they had suggested a type of large rat they normally hunt and cook on camp!

Following an email from Scouts Against Malaria asking for donations we set each Cub a target of raising £10 each over the holidays. They actually raised ± 1600 in 2 weeks which meant we could buy 350 nets.

Via Scouts Against Malaira (SAM) and the Chief Commissioner of Ghana Scouts we got the money directly to those who could buy and distribute the nets. Before distribution, the Tamale Scouts received training from a nurse about malaria and they chose four communities who don't have close access to any health care facilities. Prior to this the Tamale Scouts had had no contact or support from the Ghana Scout Association, and so this was a major change and as a direct result of the net distribution they have invested 17 new Cubs to their Pack from remote villages (where literacy rates and opportunities are very low).

1st St Albans had a visit from the Scouts Against Malaria Commissioner who gave us a talk on malaria, and presented each of the Cubs with a certificate and SAM badge for their efforts.

Many of our Cubs are now penpals with Cubs from Tamale and are sharing letters, experiences and gifts.

Muraka Kudhin – Coral reef restoration project in the Maldives By Michael Worthy

Hertfordshire Scouts' are continuing to support this exciting environmental project in association with 18th Malé Scout Group to assist in reef rehabilitation and restoration in the region. The project is entitled "Muraka Kudhin" (meaning coral and youth in the local language) and will allow Scouts to learn about coral propagation and set up reef monitoring and maintenance of a new coral nursery. It is aligned with United Nations' Sustainable Development Goal (SDG 14) – Life Below Water, and can be shared back to Scout Groups in Hertfordshire as a great opportunity for sections wishing to work towards their Environmental Conservation activity badges and World Challenge Awards. The coastal environment management and conservation of Maldives is aligned with the Sustainable Development Goal 14 Life Below Water. With the support from our partners, 18th Malé Scout Group Scouts wish to promote the role of reef health and resilient islands to mitigate impacts from natural as well as man-made disasters.

So far Scouts have learnt the basics of scuba diving and constructed frames for propagating fragments of corals. The project will carry out monitoring of the corals and collect data such as growth rate as well as identifying the sealife that inhabits the corals. Coral reefs are projected to decline by 70-90% at global temperature rises of 1.5° C with larger losses greater than 90% projected at 2°C. Hertfordshire Scouts have provided equipment to help with the monitoring progress.

4. Scouts in Maldives undertake coral reef restoration



Muraka Kudhin is a reef rehabilitation project run by Muhyiddin Scout Group in Vilimale', Maldives. Since 2019, the Scout group comprises PADI certified Scout divers who have been running reef checks, restoring corals and monitoring reef health. The aim of the Muraka Kudhin project is to rehabilitate reefs that have suffered the consequences of climate change through coral restoration. The project is supported by Moodhubulhaa Dive Center, Save the Beach Maldives & Hertfordshire Scouts in the UK - all focused on conserving reefs and beaches of Vilimale'.

Following selection weekends held across the County Hertfordshire Scouts successfully filled 3 Units with both Leader and Young People.

UNIT 22 - Journey Review

So far on our Jamboree Journey we have met every month since January. Our first two meetings focussed heavily on ice breaking, team building and rather a lot of name learning! At our first meeting (despite some curveballs thrown to us by Covid!) we all managed to spend at least one minute talking to every other member of Unit 22, as part of our 'speed meeting' session, as well as having plenty more time through the day to settle in around some problem-solving tasks and team challenges. We rounded off the day with a quiz, with Dave snagging the win via Zoom with only one point between him and the team in second place! We continued building on our team working skills, as well as trying some exciting activities in our February meeting where Unit 22 enjoyed both some axe throwing and orienteering at 2nd/7th Welwyn Garden City's HQ and nearby Stanborough Lakes.

As a Unit we were keen to start working on our identity and branding early on in our journey. Our Unit members had several sessions across our first 2 meetings to come up with proposed Unit names, badges and hoodie designs. Following two rounds of voting they managed to whittle down from a whole host of options to their final choice, which was revealed to the Unit members at our March camp. Having been assigned number 22 there was one standout direction to take our Unit identity in, so we are Unit 22 – The Quackers!

March saw us complete our first Unit camp together. We started off at 1st Redbourn for our first night and hiked over to relatively nearby 1st Kings Langley for our second night. At Redbourn we enjoyed quite a few memorable moments together; namely, our first campfire, receiving our UK Contingent neckers around the fire, our first group cooked meal (a full English breakfast no less!) and our first night away together! We set off in the morning with each Quacker carrying all their own kit for the roughly 8-mile journey down to Kings Langley. Despite some cold weather and patchy rain we all made it, and arrived only an hour or so after expected. We'll blame the delay on an extended lunch break!



After some time to chill out and a short spontaneous dance session after our hike, the Quackers split off into Patrols to cook our evening meal, in a format similar to that of a Jamboree site. We enjoyed a quick spaghetti refuel and then settled in for the evening, deciding via a quick show of hands that we'd prefer to sleep indoors than re-pitch our tents! The evening consisted of a few big reveals to our Unit members, following their final round of voting; our Unit name, The Quackers, our badge design, and our 'big city' visit location, Seoul. On Sunday morning we had sessions on getting the word out about the Jamboree and how to describe it to people who we might come across during our fundraising, who know nothing about Scouts. We also discussed how we plan to support each other on our journey to Korea, as well as some dreams, goals and expectations for when we're out there.

Over the Easter weekend in April, we ran an Easter Egg Hunt fundraiser to start the ball rolling with our Unit fundraising. We ran the 2-day event alongside 1st Redbourn who were also fundraising, for a defibrillator for the village. We ran long and short egg hunt courses, a BBQ, a raffle, hook a duck, soak a Scout, beat the goalie, a colouring competition, and cooked s'mores. We all enjoyed the sunny weather and raised around £800 towards our Unit fundraising that will go towards our training events, Unit merchandise and our Unit's adventures out in Korea!

Our May meet was our second Unit camp, this time at Rickmansworth and Chorleywood District Campsite. We spent the Saturday building shelters for the night and enjoying a BBQ dinner, before enjoying some downtime to catch up with each other. In the evening we headed off to a fundraiser for one of our Ducks, to watch a band play and dance the night away! Sunday saw us walking down to Batchworth Sea Scouts HQ and heading out on the canal in kayaks, canoes and a dragon boat. We all got a bit of a soaking, either from the rain or from an accidental yet refreshing dip in the water!

We have discussed our goals, hopes and dreams for our Jamboree Journey and for out in Korea too. Our Unit members are looking forward to continuing to get to know each other and travelling the furthest they ever have from home after a few years of being unable to be in large groups, go to camp or travel abroad. On-site they are hoping to try lots of new foods from across the globe, looking forward to meeting the challenge of communicating with people while speaking no common language, and swapping badges and scarves with new-found friends. They also hope to be able to make the most of their time in Seoul, visiting plenty of attractions and cultural sites throughout their time in the capital. We are currently looking forward to the Herts Jamboree Bonanza, a summer fete style event that all 3 Hertfordshire Units are co-hosting on the 17th July up at Tolmers Activity Centre. We will be running a range of fun stalls and adventurous activities to continue to support our fundraising efforts. The event will be open to all Groups within the County and we hope to be able to showcase what each Unit has been up to so far, meet Young People from all sections of Hertfordshire Scouting and help them to understand and get excited about international Scouting. We hope this will be a great way to help others get a feel for the Jamboree atmosphere and engage Young People, Parents and Leaders alike in County events and our journey to Korea – we hope to see you there!

Welcome to Unit 24, otherwise known as ALTAIR...

As one of three units in the Hertfordshire Contingent heading to South Korea for the 25th World Scout Jamboree, Altair Unit has been taking its first steps towards to the experience of a lifetime.

The majority of the Unit along with our leader team, met for the first time at a Scout hut in North Watford in Jan 2022.... fortunately a significant number of the Unit were able to attend considering that we were still in uncertain times with the pandemic, however at the last minute unfortunately one of the young people and one of leaders tested positive with Covid so it was a case of bringing in the technology to try to keep everyone involved.... The contingency plan kicked in as we expected this may be the case for the longer term and we wanted to ensure we could find a way to involve everyone regardless of the situation.

The theme for our first session was "Meet the Unit" with the aim for everyone starting to get to know each other. Everyone had the chance to introduce themselves, talk about the expectations and some fun facts...we have so many musicians in the Group that we should not be struggling for some good camp fire songs. We ran a few team building games, alongside some bases to allow young people and leaders to get to know each other and for the Unit to let us leaders know what they wanted to do for future events. It was really impressive to see how quickly the Unit started to bond and work together during activities and cooking.....and for many of us, finally the chance to get round the camp fire to share stories with the inevitable smores before bed time..... marshmallows, choccie biscuits and campfire seems to be the three items that bonds all ages of Scouts together...here are a few pictures from our first event...



UNIT 24 - Part 2

February 2022 training saw us at a farm in Royston and with our next theme as "Identity builder"...could we define an identity with a Unit name and logo after this session. It was a great site in Royston that provided us some space to run bases inside whilst some plenty of outdoor space to continue to have those team events and to allow those who wanted to camp. Several activities over the weekend were designed to look at ideas for a Unit name, more team building and a chance to experience some Korean kimbap that is a Korean version of sushi.

Kimbap are Korean rice rolls that might look a lot like sushi but, in truth, are nothing like it. Japanese sushi is made out of rice seasoned with vinegar and customarily features raw fish, seafood, and vegetables, whereas Korean rolls use sesame oil in the rice and a variety of fillings, including meats, imitation crab, ham, eggs and cheese. While similar in some aspects, the rolls also aren't eaten with the same accompaniments; neither soy sauce nor wasabi appears on the kimbap plate. It's usually served with kimchi and pickled vegetables on the side.

Several interesting names and logos from the session that then led to several rounds of voting to start the process of defining our Unit name... lots of healthy discussions and debates.



March training sees our moving to Stevenage and a day hike to get our Unit used to walking.... One fact guaranteed at a Jamboree is achieving that daily step count...but forget the daily 10,000 steps as it will be a lot more. The Unit split into four teams and met at different locations before a short hike into Stevenage. Another good chance for the Unit to get to know each other and then the day ended with some games and snacks as well as being able to hand out our UK Contingent neckers to the Unit... very exciting

April should have been our first camp at Phasels but the weather was not kind to us and due to the nature of the activities that we had planned, we decided to move to an indoor camp so with some quick logistical changes we headed back to a Watford location.

The Queen's Jubilee and Queen's Scout Awards

The award originated as the King's Scout Award in 1909; on the death of Queen Elizabeth's father in 1952 the Queen's Scout Award was introduced. The first Queen's Scout in Hertfordshire completed his award on the day of the King's death, hence he was one of the first in the country to gain the new award.

There was continued success from Scouts in achieving the award through the 1950s and into the 1960s.

In 1967 Ventures Scouts replaced the Rover Scout and Senior Scout programmes with the Queen's Scout Award as the highest award. In 1976, the Venture Scout programme was opened up to females, and from that time they have been gaining the Queen's Scout Award in increasing numbers.

Venture Scouting was at is its strongest in the 1980s when it was quite fashionable to be in a 'Unit', however numbers declined in the 1990s as the target age-group were staying on at school longer and the educational demands on 16- to 18-year olds placed a limit on their free time.

In 2002 Explorer Scouts and Network were formally introduced, with Explorers being for 14 to 17 and Network for 18 to 24 year-olds. The Queen's Scout Award has remained the highest achievement for both sections.

The Queen's Scout Award is linked closely to the Duke of Edinburgh's Gold Award, with the Gold Award being allowed to count for the five challenges of the QSA.

In Hertfordshire 124 QSAs have been achieved in the last 10 years, with 34 being female. In the last two years numbers have been down, as with all Scouting Covid has reduced and limited Scouting activities.

Despite these restrictions five Hertfordshire Explorer Scouts / Network members are to be congratulated on achieving their QSAs during 2021.

Activity Centres Mark Jefferson, ACMC Chairman

We re-opened our Centres at Easter, with the initial focus being on supporting Groups with the return to Scouting. This was initially with evening and weekend visits, with residential activity starting back up in July.

We supported this activity with a limited core team of staff and our volunteer service teams. Our focus has been on maintenance to support the re-opening of our indoor accommodation, with building capacities reduced to meet the Covid Guidance. From September onwards our accommodation was booked most weekends.

Visitor numbers were good, from April-September 2021 1,224 visited Harmergreen Wood, 14,240 Phasels Wood, 10,749 Well End and 7,301 Tolmers. Visit lengths varied, with some just being there for an evening, some for several days. Looking ahead numbers for 2022 are very positive and there are plans for the return of organised events.

In December the trustees met and approved the development work to be undertaken at Lochearnhead Scout Station, with builders scheduled to start work in January 2022. Once approved by the trustees, planning and Scottish building warrant applications were submitted – with planning approval received in January '22.

The trustees would like to recognise the significant efforts that have gone into re-opening our Centres, both from the limited staff team we retained and our Active Support Units and thank them all for their continued support.

It might be difficult to believe, but one of the greatest challenges I have faced over the last two years has been what to write in the Annual County Review.

I am forever indebted to all who have worked so hard, and in such an innovative way, to keep Scouting going throughout Hertfordshire during the last couple of years. You are remarkable people.

I am confident that have now emerged a stronger organisation, capable of delivering Scouting with invigorated enthusiasm and that it is now time to start looking to the future and planning our priorities for the next few years. For the County these will include: recovering our youth membership to early 2020 levels; recruiting new adult volunteers to help us achieve sustainable growth; reducing our waiting lists to enable more young people to participate in the Scouting adventure; to become more inclusive and make a positive impact on our communities; but, above all, to deliver an inspiring Scouting programme to our youth membership and help equip them with skills that will prepare them for the years ahead.

Of course, setting out priorities is one thing – delivering them is another. We all want a brighter future for Scouting and our young people, so let's start planning for it NOW.
